







Robert Norton Ganz Jr. of Chilmark, an English professor and World War II veteran who earned a Purple Heart, died on April 9 after a brave battle with sarcoma. He was 97 and had been a Vineyarder for 85 years. "Here lies the late Bob Ganz — but better late than never" was the epitaph he once joked he wanted. He died late in age but all too soon for his family. He was born in Boston on July 27, 1925 to Claire Louise MacIntyre Ganz and Robert N. Ganz Sr., a pediatrician. He attended Browne and Nichols School — which later became the Buckingham Browne & Nichols School in Cambridge. His best friends at Brown and Nichols included Robert Whitman, Norwood Smith, and Peter Powers. Mr. Powers was, with Bob, a co-captain of their track team, and he died during the Battle of the Bulge. Bob first came to Martha's Vineyard with his parents in the summer of 1936 to visit Dr. Thomas Goethals and his wife Mary. At their suggestion, Bob's parents bought Hollyholm, a summer home in Chilmark, just in time for the 1938 hurricane. After the war, he returned to Harvard, where he became the jazz reviewer for The Harvard Crimson and co-founder of the Harvard Jazz Club. He graduated with an AB in American Studies and stayed on to complete his MA and PhD in English, studying the poetry of Robert Frost. Bob met Anne Hotchkiss in the summer of 1962. After an autumn of correspondence, their first date occurred when he invited her to Robert Frost's funeral in February 1963. Bob said afterwards that Frost, as an ironist, would not have minded it being the occasion for him to fall in love. They were married August 28, 1963, at the Old Whaling Church in Edgartown. He and Anne had four children. He was a loving and amusing father and said he enjoyed coming home to a group of people who were in his corner. Anne and Bob moved to Chilmark to live year-round in 2013. He had long suspected his "better self lay beneath the leaves on Martha's Vineyard," as he wrote in an early letter to Anne. This retreat to the woods of Hollyholm allowed him to observe the seasons, deepen relationships with friends and family both on and off the Island, and continue his scholarship. Bob is survived by his wife Anne; children Claire, Jennie, Holly and Robert 3rd; and grandchildren Owen and Hugh Singer and Henry and Mina Ganz.







After a period of declining health, Robert Willard Jones died peacefully in Framingham on May 24, 2023. He was 84. He was the son of the late Herbert and Evelyn (Chambers) Jones, and the beloved husband of Martha (Chen) Jones. Robert is also survived by his brother, Peter Jones and his wife Carol of Rochester, NY, his nephew, Michael Jones, and his niece Debra Jones-Pierce.

Robert was born and raised in Dorchester and spent the summer months, and many weekends offseason, at the family cottage at 42 Trinity Park. 




John Raisian, the Hoover Institution's Tad and Dianne Taube Director for a quarter-century, from his appointment in 1990 until his retirement in 2015, died on April 24, 2023 after battling a long illness. He was 73. During his tenure, Raisian led the Institution to become the most important academic public policy research center in the nation. "A highly regarded economist, dedicated public servant, and of course, twenty-five-year director of the Hoover Institution, John was the embodiment of putting ideas into service for the betterment of humankind," said Condoleezza Rice, the current director of the Hoover Institution. "His legacy is one that will live on every day as we seek to put ideas into action that will help define and sustain a free society. He was a pillar of the Hoover community, a cherished colleague, and friend to so many." Prior to his arrival at Hoover, Raisian had a distinguished career that spanned the executive branch of government, academia, and the private sector. After earning his PhD in economics from the University of California–Los Angeles, Raisian was a visiting professor of economics at the University of Washington (1975–76) and an assistant professor of economics at the *University of Houston (1976–80).* Raisian began his tenure at the dawn of the post-Cold War era and organized the Institution's research initiatives under three core themes that addressed opportunities and challenges emerging for America and the free world in the coming century: democracy and free markets; American institutions and economic performance; and international rivals and global cooperation. A defining moment of Raisian's career was his acceptance of the National Humanities Medal on behalf of the Hoover Institution in November 2006. The prestigious award was presented by President George W. Bush at a White House ceremony. Upon receiving the medal, Raisian said, "To have the medal awarded by the president to the Hoover Institution . . . is a wonderful tribute and a huge source of pride for all of us." Raisian's colleagues speak of him affectionally as having a unique combination of professional and interpersonal skills and use words to describe his personality such as genial, gracious, accommodating, tenacious, focused, and deeply principled. John Raisian is survived by his wife, Claudia Morgan, and his daughters.







He considered this his proudest professional accomplishment and was awarded an Olympic medal from the Seoul Olympic Organizing Committee for extraordinary support. Ron earned a third master's degree, in Adult Education, from Kansas State University in 1993. He worked in management at Sprint for 10 years, then as a consultant at Right Management in Kansas City. After Ron retired fully in 2010, he devoted himself to his family. He showed his great love for them by taking over the kitchen and cooking family and holiday dinners (including Thanksgiving 2022, just before his passing), cultivating his vegetable and financial gardens, spending time at his beloved family cottage on Martha's Vineyard, outmaneuvering his children for triple-word-score squares in Scrabble, and dispensing sage life advice to them. 



Although he chose economics, he was a lifelong letter writer known for his witticisms and infamous Christmas letters in which did not hold back on liberal politics. Herb was a retired vice president and secretary of the Federal Reserve Bank of Boston. He had previously taught economics at Babson College, University of Vermont, The City College of New York, and Muskingum College in Ohio. Thanks to the artist William Blakesley, a Muskingum colleague, the Wasses were introduced to the Vineyard as assistant house parents at the youth hostel. In 1963 they bought a gingerbread cottage in the Martha's Vineyard Camp Meeting Association — the one closest to the Oak Bluffs fire department engine number four back in the day. Herb once chased off boys flirting with a daughter's friend, when he bound up in a Superman T-shirt. In later years he had the T-shirt gift-wrapped, and he presented it to his wife Dorothy at an anniversary dinner, pronouncing her the real superhero in the family. Herb is survived by his wife Dorothy; daughters Peggy Sturdivant and her spouse Martin Tollefson, and Gretchen Rehak and her spouse Walter Rehak; and grandchildren Emily, Jonah, Sarah, and Grace. He is also survived by his older sister Nancy Robertson, her husband Kenneth and their children; and the three daughters of his late sister Mary Ellen Osborne, all of whom were his favorite niece.



Douglas West, a year round resident of Martha's Vineyard since 2017, died peacefully surrounded by his family on Dec. 16 in Falmouth. He was 77.

He first came to the Island in 1952 at the invitation of Phil and Anita Buddington, whom his mother had met at her first post-college job. He came every year thereafter, staying with the Buddingtons until 1960, when his parents bought Reunion, an 1869 gingerbread cottage at 4 Forest Circle in the Campground. His granddaughter Grace is the fourth generation of Wests to make Reunion her summer home.

He was born September 24, 1945, in Bellaire, Ohio. He graduated from Michigan State University with a B.A. in pre-law and played cornet in the marching band. He graduated cum laude from the Detroit College of Law (now Michigan State University College of Law). He was as a clerk to the Hon. Judge Ralph Freeman of the U.S. District Court, who, until Doug's last day, sat on his shoulder as the good angel consulted for the right course of action. He then joined Ford Motor Company's Office of General Counsel.

He was an executive on loan as chief executive officer and chief operating officer of the U.S. Pavilion at Aichi World Expo 2005, a public-private partnership with the U.S. Department of State in Japan, where he financed, staffed, designed, built, operated, and closed the pavilion operation, hosting more than one million visitors during its six-month term. He and his wife Irene lived in Japan for eight months. In retirement he was commodore of the Balboa Yacht Club in Newport Beach, CA, and an avid yachtsman aboard his Tiara, named Islander after the much-loved ferry that first brought him to Martha's Vineyard.

On the Vineyard he was a director of the Martha's Vineyard Campmeeting Association, a member of the Chilmark Conservation Committee, vice chair of the Vineyard Conservation Society, and a director of VOLF, now known as Vineyard Community Lands. He was passionate about saving open space on the Vineyard. He loved and celebrated his diverse family and was proud to be part of an African American, Danish, Mexican, Afghan, Nigerian, and Filipino family. He was predeceased by his parents Melvin and Jane West, and his brother Thomas Gregory West.

Doug is survived by his wife of 36 years, Irene Ziebarth, stepson Rob Ziebarth and his wife Sadia Raoufi, daughter Michelle Wood and her husband Chris Wood, son Doug DelVigna, daughter Erika West and her husband Azubike Kalu Nwiwu Jr, granddaughters Macy and Sally Wood and Grace Kelechi West Kalu-Nwiwu, sister in law Darcie West, nephew Brian West and his wife Stephanie West, niece Mallory Carroll and her husband Jamie Carroll, grandnephews Matthew and Micah West and Max and Lee Carroll, and grandniece Jane West.
